UWH Euroclubs 2017 in Saint-Malo, France

29. - 30. April 2017

We made our merry and varied ways to St Malo, France, in order to play hockey against some strong teams. Sadly we were unable to field a full team of players from Zurich, so Martin called on some of his international contacts to find players willing to do battle for Switzerland. Some flew in from as far afield as Canada (thanks Dave!), others drove, and three (including myself) took the TGV from Zurich via Paris. We arrived in St Malo at various times over the day and those of us who arrived a bit earlier stretched our legs to see a bit of the town. Krishna had already done some

scouting, and located a few essentials (supermarket, patisserie, café). After a short walk around town, we settled down for a strategy meeting in a pub. A few went back to the hotel to rest up after that, while the rest of us found an Italian restaurant to load up on pizza and pasta. Our last few team members arrived during dinner, and were made welcome with more pasta and some bottles of the local cider.

With everybody in town, ten of us went back to our hotel rooms – to the nine beds which we had been told would sleep twelve. On the next day we were in a different pool, facing those who had been assigned to the bottom group.

Next we were against Scotland again. Once more they scored twice, but we were unable to find the goal with the puck. There were two occasions we came within a stick-length of the goal,

Next we changed caps to face Sub Cagliari. We were playing cleanly, but became frustrated by the number of times the referees called fouls against us. In the end the result was 3-0 to the Italians.

Our final match was also the final match in our pool. We faced Barramoenda, who had barely missed out on a place in the higher group. They showed their superior power by scoring eleven goals against us, with no reply, to win every match in our group.

A special mention needs to be given to Thomas Griffon, from Rennes. He joined our team at the last minute, when Johanna let us know she was unable to attend, and played centre back for every match, without substitution. A true machine!
